




What can I see in my setting?

Think about shapes, colours, sizes, actions, movement, weather, objects, animals, plants.



What can I hear in my setting?

High or low pitch? High or low in volume? Does the weather make any sounds? What about the animals? Do the plants make sounds when the wind blows? Are there people in your setting? What might they say? Laughter? Anger? Singing? How does the ground sound underfoot?




What can I feel in my setting?

Think about temperature, textures of objects in the picture, think about the emotions you might feel in your setting. What do the animals feel like? How does their teeth feel compared to their fur, feathers or

What can I taste in my setting?

Can you almost taste food cooking? Can you taste the salty sea air? Gritty sand? Sweet chocolate air? If your picture is fantastical, can you taste the rainbows or colourful rain? How do you imagine the shooting stars or the dessert island might taste? Be bold!



What do all the objects smell like. Does the ground smell different to the air? Is the air sweet? Can you smell food wafting? Barbecues? Can you smell the sea? Or flowers or plants? Has it been raining? Has the grass been mown?
